Dear Students, Faculty, Alums, and Friends:

Welcome to fall semester 2015. I hope that summer provided you with ample time to write, travel, spend time with friends and loved ones, and work in meaningful ways. We in Creative Writing appreciate your connection to us and the wonderful news we frequently hear about your successes in writing, teaching, and collaborating in the community of writers.

The news here is that our 60 year-old Poetry Center and American Poetry Archives received renewal as a Research and Service Organization. Steve Dickison, its director, was re-appointed to a joint faculty-staff position, and the center received high praise in its review. It has a new relationship with the university and will be able to move its valuable holdings online more quickly for the poetry world to enjoy. Playwriting is also enjoying its GreenHouse class, which stages student plays and promotes the work of its playwrights. Fiction will have a presence in the Poetry Center series with John Keene this fall and the annual Gina Berriault event in spring. Writers on Writing, every Monday in 133 Hum, posts it visiting writing on the LCA website. Everyone is invited to hear a new author discuss his/her book weekly at 7pm.

In addition to this, there are new and visiting faculty: Professor of Communication Studies Javon Johnson, a slam and performance poet, is also teaching a course for us this semester; MFA alums Ben Black, Kelly Gilbert, Matthew Iribarne, and in spring Gerardo Pacheco. Carolina de Robertis will also join us. Poet Arisa White will be teaching and working part-time in the Poetry Center in spring. They join Michael David Lukas as 2015-16 faculty. Our tenure-track faculty member ZZ Packer has extended her stay at Radcliffe. She should rejoin us in fall of 2016.

I am asking alums, students, and faculty to consider contributing to our three worthwhile magazines. Because of new rules with Instructionally Related Activity funding and a second funding crisis in the College of Liberal & Creative Arts, there is far lower support for *Transfer* and Fourteen Hills: The SFSU Review, our 21 year-old and 57 year-old journals. Any funds that you might be able to offer would help them continue to publish two volumes a year each. We have a sponsor for the Michael Rubin Award (more on this later) but also need funding for New American Writing, publishing one issue a year and in its 31st year with that title. All six volumes could be published for \$13,000 a year, which, given their excellence, fine reputations and active notice in the literary world, is a small amount. Please consider contributing and also providing funds for the department to give students opportunities to hear guest readers and for CW to cover everyday costs of subscriptions, receptions, judges for contests, many small costs that the college doesn't fund.

You can make contributions right in our main page.

We are pleased this year to have a tenure-track search approved for a writer of fiction and Spanish literary translation. This person will serve our fiction staff and also help us start our 5th degree concentration for the MFA in literary translation next fall.

I hope you have a wonderful year in the department. We are here to advise you, teach you, support you, and help you participate in our community of writers. We are very proud of your accomplishments and hope to hear from you soon.
